OUR MINISTER'S MESSAGE




Dear sisters and brothers in our Lord and His servant Saint Francis. May the Lord give you His peace!

On this great Solemnity of the Blessed Apostles, Saints Peter and Paul (June 29th), may we

never cease to give thanks to the Lord for the gift of His Holy Catholic Church which He founded on Saint Peter's confession of faith and which was extended throughout the world by the fearless preaching of Saint Paul! I invite you to reflect upon the words of one of the questions asked of the Candidates by the Celebrant during the **Rite of Profession** to the Gospel Life for Secular Franciscans: "You have been made members of the People of God by your Baptism, and strengthened in Confirmation by the new gift of the Spirit, in order to proclaim Christ by your life and your words. Do you wish to bind yourself more closely to the Church and to work intently to rebuild the ecclesial community and fulfill its mission among all people?" (*Ritual of the* OFS, page 22). May our response, "**Yes, this** is what I want," inspire our efforts to live the Gospel of Jesus Christ in the manner of Saint Francis of Assisi as faithful daughters and sons of the Church our Seraphic Father loved and served so completely!

Our triennial Fraternal and Pastoral Visitation as a Region was celebrated the weekend of



April 13-15, 2018. We are very grateful to our Visitors from the National Fraternity, our National Vice-Minister, Mary Bittner, O.F.S. and our National Spiritual Assistant, Father Jerome Wolbert, O.F.M. for their love, their encouragement and their support. Although we are still awaiting the official written report from our Visitors, I can tell you from their verbal comments shared with the Regional Fraternity Council on Sunday morning that they recognize how we have collaboratively worked together to stabilize our Region, to provide reasonable governance structures, to support and develop our common formation efforts, to maintain dependable accountability of our Region to NAFRA and to our sisters and brothers at the

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local level of fraternity, and to encourage our members in the daily living out of their Franciscan vocations. Their challenge to us: **Go forth and live the Gospel!**

The morning of June 5, 2018 brought great joy to my heart when I checked the day's e-mail and found a letter addressed to me from Father Michael Zielke, O.F.M. Conv., the Minister Provincial of St. Bonaventure Province, officially appointing Father Giles Gilbert, O.F.M. Conv. to serve as one of our Regional Spiritual Assistants! Father Giles has been serving as the local Spiritual Assistant of our Sacred Heart Fraternity since being assigned as Parochial Vicar of Holy Family Parish in Peoria. Since then, he has been in the process of gearing up to assume his new responsibilities within our Franciscan family. The Regional Spiritual Assistant is the concrete sign of the unity that exists between our Order and the friars of the First Order and Third Order Regular. So - welcome, Father Giles! Thank you for saying "Yes" to this appointment which is truly an answer to the prayers of the sisters and brothers of our Regional family.

Preparation for the Regional Elective Chapter: March 9-10, 2019

I would like to recommend that all of us be engaged in the Discernment Process concerning our Elective Chapter which will occur on Saturday, March 9, 2019. I am using one of the handouts from the *Regional Formation Resource Kit* which addresses *Aspects of the Discernment Process*. I believe that it will be advantageous for us to look at the different aspects of discernment over the next several months.

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The first aspect to consider is: Relationship. A person must be in relationship with God to be able to discern His will. It is wonderful to pray to God and let him know our thoughts, desires, hopes, disappointments, etc. However, there also needs to be quiet time for us to LISTEN to God. Some may find it challenging to just sit and be quiet but we need to be in the right frame of mind to hear God's voice. It may take some time to feel comfortable in waiting for God to speak (while we listen), but please let us practice it awhile and see what happens! Once we are comfortable with praying and listening, then we can dialogue. We can talk with someone with whom we are in relationship: Fraternity member, parish priest or deacon, personal friend, family member, etc. The goal is to be involved in the process so that we are open to discerning God's will for us!

A person discerns God's will through:

- ♦ Prayer
- ♦ Listening
- ♦ Dialogue

May you experience a deeper relationship with God as you discern God's will for you and the March 2019 Regional Elective Chapter!

The Regional Day of Reflection for those in Initial Formation and Workshop for Formation Directors and Formation Team Members will occur on **Saturday, July 21, 2018** at the Chiara Center from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. There is **NO registration/meal cost** for the day for eligible participants, only their own transportation to and from the Chiara Center. The event is part of the Regional Formation Director's Budget which was approved by the Regional Fraternity Council in September 2017!

The participants for this event for Track I (Initial Formation Day of Reflection) are: **Inquirers** (those who went through the *Ceremony of Introduction and Welcoming* or those who will go through that *Ceremony* prior to July 21, 2018) and **Candidates** (those who have gone through the *Rite of Admission* or will be going through the *Rite of Admission* or will be going through the *Rite prior* to July 21, 2018). Track 2: Workshop for **Formation Directors and Formation Team Members**. Those who are **Newly Professed** or are Professed by July 21, 2018 had the choice to participate either in Track I or Track 2. Also, the members of the Regional Executive Council (REC) were invited and selected either Track to attend.

A Spiritual Assistant has been added to the REC. Our Regional Minister sent an email on June 7, 2018, to the Regional Fraternity Council, that stated that there was "white smoke" present as we welcomed Fr. Giles Gilbert, O.F.M. Conventual as a Regional Spiritual Assistant.

Fr. Giles as the Regional Spiritual Assistant has graciously offered to assist in any way he could with our July 21st Regional Day. So, Fr. Giles will be offering Mass for the participants on Saturday morning in St. Francis of Assisi Church! He also will facilitate a Prayer

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Experience for both Tracks from 1:00 to 1:30 p.m.

This year Formation Directors/Team Members will share how the *Regional Formation Resource Kit* was used in the Fraternity since July 2017. The Fraternity which utilized the most handouts from the *Kit* will receive a Franciscan item for the Fraternity! We will also spend time

discussing the Fraternity's successes, challenges and answering Formation-related questions.



Ongoing Formation Report April 14, 2018

Background: June 24, 2018 is the beginning of the year-long celebration of the 40th Anniversary of the promulgation of the current *Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order*.

Fraternal Visitor, Mary Bittner, O.F.S., NAFRA Vice-Minister, facilitated a hands-on formation experience for the Regional Fraternity Council and Observers. Mary stated that during this



Visitation she wished to work with us on our *Rule*, reminding us that there are not 26 Rules, but instead we have one *Rule* with 26 Articles.

Mary noted that only a few people present were professed under the prior *Rule of 1883*. She pointed out that the old *Rule* was very specific on how we were to live and in what specific

ways we were called to do so. Then jumping ahead to Vatican II, she noted we were asked by the Holy Father to return to our roots. He was referring to all Religious Orders. He called us to refresh ourselves.

Mary then outlined a project that our General Spiritual Assistants did to rewrite/revise the Rule of 1883. This effort was brought to the "body" and the response was negative. She pointed out that one could read more of this history as some of the information is found in the appropriate chapter of the FUN Manual. However, upon hearing the comments, the Friars met again and realized that when they had previously met there were no Secular Franciscans present. Therefore, in 1969 a Congress convened in Assisi which brought forth a listing of 17 Essential Elements of a spirituality of a new Rule, and also 6 more points emphasizing Franciscan Spirituality. Then in 1978, The Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order was finalized and promulgated on June 24, 1978 by Blessed Pope Paul VI.

Mary asked each of us to look back to the time of Francis and the first *Rule* of his teachings, pointing out they came from Scripture. She then asked everyone to reflect individually on how he/she would make a *Rule of Life* to inspire us to express or reflect our way of living the Gospel.

After some personal reflection time, the participants were divided into small groups. Each group designed their own "Rule" using Scripture quotes and Franciscan spirituality. After an allotted time, each group had a spokesperson who shared the group's "Rule" with the entire group. Many ideas and passages from Scriptures were shared, such as: Acts 2; Phil 2; Col. 3:12; Psalms I-4I, 37:5-7; Matt 4-8, 25, 28; Mark I; Luke 10:29, 15-11-32, 24:13; John I, 6, 10-14, 21; Jer 15:16 & Isaiah 42. Mary thanked everyone for their willingness to share, and noted how each of us brought forth different Scriptures and thoughts.

Regional Executive Council and the National Visitors

The Regional Executive Council meet with the National Visitors, Mary Bittner, O.F.S. and Fr. Jerome Wolbert, O.F.M., on Friday evening of April 13th. This gave an opportunity for sharing, questions and reviewing of appropriate documentation for each Executive Council member. This was followed by dinner and evening prayer and discussion.

Topics of discussion were: the absence of a Regional Spiritual Assistant for our Region. Fr. Jerome noted that each of our Provinces have a responsibility to provide a Regional Spiritual Assistant.

Discussion was held on the Spiritual Assistant Formation Program with Fr. Jerome recommending the possibility of collaborating with other connecting Regions. It was pointed out that if anyone would be interested in the Spiritual Assistant Program they should contact the Regional Minister for guidance on this process.

Informal discussion was then held with Mary reviewing the challenges that were expressed on the Pre-Visitation Questionnaire. Fr. Jerome reminded the Council to tend to the Spiritual Health of the Fraternities. He noted the importance to be aware of how we portray our charism, that this is what attracts more vocations. We should all remember to encourage each other to always wear our TAU cross, as it fosters awareness and inquiries.

Discussion was held on the challenges our Region faces. Also discussed was that the National Executive Council has a Vocations Tool Kit available on the website. Mary also noted that the *Regional Formation Resource Kit* has received great praise for our Region.

Continued discussion was held on Vocations, how to foster them, and also to reach out to our Active/Excused members. Our Active/Excused members serve as an Apostolate of Prayer for the Fraternity along with Vocations, the Visitations, Retreats and the entire Council.

The topic of *Perfect Joy* was discussed. Fr. Jerome shared these comments: "If you want spiritual growth and perfect joy - pray for graces; in difficult times - pause, don't react. Calm down & pray, such as the Jesus Prayer;" and "to seek a Spiritual Director or even share with each other, or just pray together." He shared that having peace in your heart during times of difficulty and when bad things happen is "Perfect Joy."

The business included establishing our Nominating Co-Chairs, Matt and Kevin, for the 2018 Elections. As our Elections approach, may we each be open to the Holy Spirit if we are called upon to this Servant Leadership.

Let us continue to pray for our Region and be assured that the Executive Council is praying for all of you too.

Regional Fraternity Council Meeting

The meeting was held on April 14-15, 2018 at the Chiara Center in Springfield, IL. Not only did we have regular business to discuss, we also had both a Pastoral and Fraternal visitation. We were blessed to have Mary Bittner, O.F.S., National Vice-Minister, and Fr. Jerome Wolbert, O.F.M. one of our National Spiritual Assistants join us for the weekend. Our Visitors spent Friday evening April 13th going over the region's books and interacting with the Regional Fraternity Executive Council.

Saturday began with Mass. Following Mass, Deacon Dave, O.F.S. introduced our visitors

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and they provided us with ongoing formation activities. Mary handed out a sheet that listed the 17 Essential Elements of a New Rule from the Assisi Congress - October 1969. She then asked us to work in small groups to develop a new Rule based on these elements. We were asked to provide Scripture references and then write a Rule based on what we decided to include. This task was quite intense. The groups spent a good deal of time looking up Scripture that could demonstrate each of the elements.

Some of the elements that were included in the list were:

- 1. "To live the Gospel according to St. Francis"
- 2. To live in Communion with Christ
- 3. To live in joy
- 4. To be pilgrims on the way to the Father
- 5. To be open to the Action of the Spirit
- 6. To live in simplicity, humility and minority
- 7. To be instruments of peace

Our time was up before any of the groups got a chance to write a rule. It is easy to see why it takes so long to write a Rule and how hard those who came before us had to work to get it just the way they wanted it.

Fr. Jerome shared with us some of St. Anthony's reflection on the Gospel of Doubting Thomas. Why did Christ have to show his wounds to Thomas - to show that He had truly risen, to impress our hearts with notable signs of the Passion, and to provide a place for us to rest in the wounds. St. Anthony really wanted to just rest in the wounds of Christ. Such a resting place would be so welcoming for all of us.

Mary and Fr. Jerome also talked with us about Servant Leadership. They handed out a sheet of word clouds and we were asked to choose words that we would use to describe a servant leader. After a few minutes, we were asked to share some of the words we had chosen and why we chose those words. As elections are approaching, this activity gave a chance to think about what we are looking for in our own fraternity leaders whether at the local or regional level.

The first part of the Regional Fraternity Business meeting took place following lunch. We approved the minutes from the October I, 2017 meeting and ratified electronic work done on our Annual Report.

Deacon Dave, O.F.S. then introduced the regional people and talked about the process of completing and submitting an Annual Report to the National Fraternity. We are continuing to search for a Regional Spiritual Assistant. Deacon Dave will keep us posted on how the search is going. We reviewed the Regional calendar and the dates for upcoming fraternal visitations and elections. At each regional meeting, we highlight a fraternity. For the March 9, 2019 meeting Pope St. John XXIII fraternity will be the regional spotlighted fraternity. Deacon Dave talked briefly about our region's Silver Jubilee Celebration that is planned for September 27-29, 2019. Kathy Adams, O.F.S. agreed to start putting something together to celebrate this momentous occasion.

John Grillot, O.F.S., our Regional Treasurer, provided us with regional financial statements including information on the Ave Maria Fund we currently invest in. John also updated us on Regional Fair Share items. We discussed the Regional retreat which will be held September 28-30, 2018 at the Chiara Center. John talked about prices for the retreat and food. The silent Auction this year will be coordinated by St. Margaret of Cortona fraternity. John also discussed the Fr. John Sullivan Memorial Retreat Scholarship Fund. This fund will help offset costs for members who would like to attend but cannot afford to pay the entire cost.

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Therese, O.F.S. our Formation Director called people's attention to the upcoming Regional Day of Reflection for those in formation and for Formation Directors and teams. Those who are newly professed will also be invited to attend this day of reflection. Therese reminded everyone that the *FUN Manual* is online and we should be using that document to guide our formation.

We had chance to talk with Mary and Fr. Jerome in an open forum setting. Many questions were asked and answered and there was a lot of lively discussion. The open forum continued after dinner and picked up where we left off from earlier. It was a real joy to have both Mary and Fr. Jerome join us for the weekend. They provided us with a lot of good information and gave us a lot to think about.

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following the way of St. Francis. As the Region is anticipating elections in 2019, we want to be aware of the Yes to the invitation to serve.

To quote Mary: "Our Order is old but as a unified Order we are relatively young. It is hard to govern people from all over the world with different cultures, languages and customs. We have to broaden our outlook."

"We develop vocations by being visible. By invitation and making present the charism of our Seraphic Father. I would remind you that you are fortunate by your proximity to each other." (Mary is referring to many areas that have great distances to travel for fraternal gatherings.)

Fr. Jerome shared the Pastoral reflection by encouraging us to make sure we petition Fr. Ed McKenzie for at least 2 Spiritual Assistants -"You cannot get by with just one." Keep in mind that the Spiritual Assistant does not have to be a Friar, but someone who is suitable and well-prepared. Who can your Fraternity "send forth to prepare in this formation?"

In addition, Fr. Jerome remarked: "I'd like to praise the camaraderie of the fraternity and the Franciscan formation. The Greek word for the process is called "synergy," meaning working together with God. If we do what God wants us to do-discern-well, and cooperate with God, this brings about synergy."

Regional Executive Council Meeting

The Regional Executive Council (REC) met on Sunday, April 15, 2018 for its regular springtime meeting. This meeting followed the Regional Fraternity Council (RFC) meeting REC

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that had been held earlier in the day. All REC members were in attendance except for Kathy Adams, O.F.S. who had previously been excused to attend a grandchild's First Holy Communion. A variety of business items were covered, including retreat stipends and the affirmation of several prior items that had been previously covered via electronic communications.

Considerable time and discussion focused on the 25th Anniversary/Silver Jubilee Celebration of our Region's founding, with the event planned for late September 2018. The discussion was for the purpose of providing the Organizing Committee (which is still being structured) with some thoughts and guidance from the REC in three areas: 1) a framework for an operating budget for the Committee; 2) an idea of what items that the Region will cover financially; and 3) possible elements of the structure for the weekend schedule. While many ideas and thoughts were developed, it was recognized that the Organizing Committee would have the wherewithal to develop their own proposal for these three areas.

With NAFRA now reenergizing the Franciscan Youth / Young Adult (FY/YA) initiative, each Region was asked to identify an FY/YA Animator. Due to her background and interest, Lori Ferris, O.F.S. (Pope Saint John XXIII fraternity) was appointed to this position for our Region. A job discussion for this position with be developed, and Mary Farrell-Diekemper, O.F.S. will be the REC liaison with Lori.

The REC appointed Matt Eppel, O.F.S. (Sacred Heart fraternity) and Kevin Kaurin, O.F.S. (St. Margaret of Cortona fraternity) as Nominations Co-Chairs in preparation for the Regional Elective Chapter to be held March 8-10, 2019. The REC also agreed to recommend retaining our two elected Councilor positions (Database Management and Vocations Promotion); this will be decided by the RFC at the September 2018 meeting.

The meeting concluded following a brief discussion regarding each of our eight local fraternities, noting any particular issues or concerns as well as upcoming events (professions, elections, visitations, etc.)

- Let the Secular Franciscans seek a proper spirit of detachment from temporal goods by simplifying their own material needs. Let them be mindful that according to the gospel they are stewards of the goods received for the benefit of God's children. (11)
- A sense of community will make them joyful and ready to place themselves on an equal basis with

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all people, especially with the lowly for whom they shall strive to create conditions of life worthy of people redeemed by Christ. (13)

• Moreover, they should respect all creatures, animate and inanimate, which "bear the imprint of the Most High," and they should strive to move from the temptation of exploiting creation to the Franciscan concept of universal kinship. (18)

So, let us continue to promote a balance of our use of resources for all who share our "common home." Let us continue to advocate for intelligent use of our natural resources that leaves a world of promise for our children and grand-children and their children. Let us " ... come together to take charge of this home which has been entrusted to us, knowing that all the good which exists here will be taken up into the heavenly feast. In union with all creatures, we journey through this land seeking God, for 'if the world has a beginning and if it has been created, we must enquire who gave it this beginning, and who was its Creator.' (Basil the Great) Let us sing as we go. May our struggles and our concern for this planet never take away the joy of our hope." (Laudato Si, 244).

St. Elizabeth of Hungary Fraternity, Quincy, IL Rite of Profession

St. Elizabeth of Hungary Fraternity of the Secular Franciscan Order happily shares the news of our recent Professions. Becky Goodwin, O.F.S. and Robie Orf, O.F.S. made a permanent commitment to the Gospel Life as they professed into the Secular Franciscan Order. This *Rite of Profession* took place during Mass at St. Francis Solanus Church, Quincy. Profession was received by the Minister, Rosanne Roy, O.F.S. and the

Celebrant and Ecclesial Witness was Fr. Don Blaeser, O.F.M. assisted by Deacon Dave Ream, O.F.S., Spiritual Assistant.

Profession in the Order is the culmination of over two years of initial formation. At their Profession the candidates promised to follow the Rule of Life of the Secular Franciscan Order, pledging themselves to live the Gospel in the manner of St. Francis by means of this *Rule*. St. Francis himself wrote the first "*Rule of Life*" for members of the Secular Franciscan Order. Since Vatican II, that *Rule* has been updated but remains true to the vision of St. Francis of Assisi. This *Rule* calls Secular Franciscans to live out our calling to the Franciscan life in a particular way in our homes and families, at work, in our parishes, and in the world.

The St. Elizabeth of Hungary Fraternity of the Secular Franciscan Order was canonically established in 1861 and began meeting in Quincy. We usually gather as a Fraternity on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 p.m. in the St. Francis Solanus Parish Center.

Teutopolis Monastery Museum Teutopolis, Illinois

Recently the Teutopolis Monastery Museum in Teutopolis, Illinois, received a new item for display. The violin that Brother Simon Van NEWS

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Ackeren, O.F.M. played as a young lad was given to the museum by Brother Simon's family. Br. Simon was born in Humphrey, Nebraska in February 1918 and christened Lawrence Van Ackeren. Throughout his youth and school years he was affectionately known as Van or Curly because of his curly, sandy colored hair. He was also known for his smile, willingness to help others and his special love for the Eucharist.

After high school, Van spent a short time at the Franciscan preparatory seminary in Mayslake, IL. Having a losing battle with his studies, he decided the priesthood was not for him. He applied for admittance to the Franciscan Lay Brotherhood and was transferred to the Teutopolis, IL seminary in January 1937. His vocation was readily recognized and he was invested with the Tertiary habit on March 2, 1937 and then answered to the name of Brother Simon. He was seen frequently in the chapel, helping in the kitchen, assisted in the shoe shop and helped out wherever he could and smiling all the day long.

In January of the following year, Br. Simon developed a slight limp because of the pain he had in his ankle. When the pain became so bad that he could hardly walk, he was admitted to the hospital for treatment, but after a month, the ankle failed to respond. He returned to the seminary on crutches and several days later, March 4, 1938, he made his profession as a Tertiary brother in the seminary chapel. The next day, Br. Simon left for St. Louis to see a specialist about his ankle. After three weeks he returned on crutches, his ankle in a cast and with the diagnosis of tuberculosis of the bone.

Even though his health continued to decline, his smile and good natured attitude stayed with him. He returned to the Effingham hospital the end of April where he passed away on the evening of May 10, 1938. His greatness was in doing the little things well. His burial was on May 13th in the mausoleum on the church grounds next to St. Francis of Assisi church in Teutopolis. As the inscription on his marker in the mausoleum states: "Being made perfect in a short space, he fulfilled a long time." (Wisdom 4:13)



Many prayers addressed to Br. Simon have been answered. A novena prayer to obtain the help of Br. Simon is available as in the booklet, "On Crutches to Heaven" by Fr. Philip Marquard, O.F.M. at the Teutopolis Museum.

The Monastery Museum in Teutopolis, IL is open to the public on the first Sunday of each month, April through November. The hours are 12:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. with a \$5 admission fee. Br. Simon's violin displayed in the museum and his burial site along with 78 other Franciscan brothers and priests buried in the mausoleum are included with the tour. The monastery museum is a memorial to the Franciscan Friars who arrived in Teutopolis in 1858, and to the early pioneers who settled in Teutopolis in 1839. The Secular Franciscans also have an area displaying their history as their local St. Francis of Assisi Fraternity, was canonically established March 6, 1864. 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Sacred Heart Fraternity, Peoria, IL Annual Day of Reflection

Sacred Heart fraternity's annual Day of Reflection was held on June 16, 2018 at St. Augustine Manor.

Fr. Giles led our day and it was very inspirational day. We first each shared our experience and knowledge regarding the Sacred Heart devotion, and how we honored the Sacred Heart of Jesus in our families. Our morning began with reflecting on excerpts from Pope Benedict XVI's February 10, 2010 General Audience on St. Anthony of Padua's understanding of prayer.

Saint Anthony speaks of prayer as a loving relationship that impels man to speak gently with the Lord, creating an ineffable joy that sweetly enfolds the soul in prayer. He reminds us that prayer requires an atmosphere of silence. It is more than distancing ourselves from external noise. This silence is an interior experience that aims to remove the distractions caused by a soul's anxieties, which in turn creates silence in the soul itself. According to his teachings, prayer is structured in four indispensable attitudes and stages:

- (**Obsecratio**) or Opening one's heart to God's presence, not merely accepting a word.
- (**Oratio**) or Speaking with him affectionately, seeing him present with oneself.

- (**Postulatio**) or something natural presenting our needs to him.
- (Gratiarum actio) or praising and thanking him.

His teachings on prayer are specific traits of the Franciscan theology:

- Divine love that enters into the sphere of the affections.
- The will and of the heart, it is also the source from which flows a spiritual knowledge surpassing all other knowledge.

Charity is the soul of faith, it gives life. Without love, faith dies. Always put Christ at the center of our life (Franciscan theology is Trinitarian and Christocentric).

We celebrated Mass after our reflection. Social time after Mass. Great food and fellowship was enjoyed by all. After social time, Fr. Giles gave us a handout on the Gospel of Matthew 11:25-30 (one of the Gospels proclaimed on the Feast of the Sacred Heart). Together, we engaged in *Lectio Divino*. We broke into three small groups to discuss what word or phrase spoke to us in the Scripture reading.

So powerful how the Lord spoke to each of us.

We finished up the afternoon by discussing the article "Franciscan Devotion to the Eucharist and to the Sacred Heart" by Margaret A. Gregory, O.F.S.

Francis while praying before the crucifix at one of the neglected chapels of Assisi heard a voice telling him to "Rebuild my church, for it is nearly in ruins."

- On that day, the life of Francis Bernardone was changed; and on that day our lives were changed.
- Our holiness is a result of our union with Christ in His Mystical Body.
- However, we are fortunate to belong to an Order of saints beginning with St. Francis

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and St. Clare, whose examples inspire us, and merits and graces are shared with us.

- St. Francis was so wise for indeed love makes all things easy.
- They are to show deep reverence for God's Churches, and make visits to them readily, whenever an opportunity occurs.
- Finally, take greatest care to make life within the family pleasant and happy. The crucifix...shall occupy the principle place in living rooms and bedrooms.
- All devotions are important but good to focus Franciscan devotion to the Eucharist and the Sacred Heart. The devotions that will most easily help us become lovers of Our Lord.
- All Franciscans should enthrone a picture or statue of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in a prominent place in the home and pray the Act of Consecration the the Sacred Heart.
- I promise you, in the excessive mercy of my Heart that my all-powerful love will grant to all those who receive Holy Communion on the first Friday for nine consecutive months, the grace of final penitence; they shall not die in My displeasure nor without their sacraments: My Divine Heart shall be their safe refuge in his last moment.

We concluded the Day of Reflection by praying the Litany of the Sacred Heart together before an image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the chapel. Afterwards, we made an Act of Consecration of the Fraternity to the Sacred Heart. The Act of Consecration was adapted from the original composed by St. Margaret Mary Alacoque.

On July 1, 2018 the Pope St. John XXIII of Rock Island, IL celebrated the Rite of Profession, during Mass at St. Vincent Center, Davenport, Iowa, for Alicia Harker, O.F.S., Roxanne Miner, O.F.S., Patrick Miner, O.F.S. and Pascal "Pat" DeLuca, O.F.S. A large number of family, friends and two additional priests from the Diocese of Davenport joined the members of the fraternity on this blessed day. TRANSITUS SERVICE IN ONE'S OWN HOME The Transitus of St. Francis (Francis passing from this life into eternal life)

Saint Francis died just after sunset on October 3rd. He recited Psalm 142 and, during the closing verse, he died. This event is solemnly recalled each year by Franciscans to honor their holy Father's entrance into joy. You are invited to commemorate this night by participating in the prayer service. The following observance may be done in the privacy of your own home or with others in your home.

[Light two candles and have a relic or image of St. Francis available as well as a crucifix, preferably a San Damiano Crucifix.]

[Begin with Evening Prayer I from the *Liturgy of the Hours*. If you do not have the *Liturgy of the Hours* or do not know how to pray it, pray instead the Fourth and Fifth Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary, *The Crucifixion of Jesus* and *The Death of Jesus on the Cross*.]

[Then read the following excerpt from Francis' *Testament*. (Francis gave it to his brothers in 1226 shortly before he died.)]

The Testament of Saint Francis

And I worked with my hands, and I still desire to work; and I earnestly desire all brothers to give themselves to honest work. Let those who do not know how to work learn, not for desire to receive wages, but for example and to avoid idleness. And when we are not paid for our work, let us have recourse to the table of the Lord, begging alms from door to door. The Lord revealed a greeting to me that we should say: "May the Lord give you peace." [*The Testament*, verses 20-23; *Francis of Assisi: Early Documents* (Vol. I: *The Saint*), Editors: Regis Armstrong, O.F.M. Cap.; J.A. Wayne Hellmann, O.F.M. Conv.; and William J. Short, O.F.M., 1999]

[Pause for a few moments of silent reflection.] [Venerate (kiss or touch) the Relic or image of St. Francis.]



Hymn (All Creatures of Our God and King) [The hymn may be sung or recited.]

All creatures of our God and King, Lift up your voice and with us sing Alleluia, alleluia! Thou burning sun with golden beam, Thou silver moon with softer gleam: O praise him, O praise him, Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia! Thou rushing winds that are so strong, Ye clouds that sail in heav'n along, O praise him, Alleluia! Thou rising morn, in praise rejoice, Ye lights of evening, find a voice: O praise him, O praise him, Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

[After the hymn, the following Antiphon is said.]

<u>Antiphon</u>: Alleluia, Alleluia, Francis, poor and humble, enters heaven rich and is welcomed with celestial hymn. Alleluia.

[Then recite Psalm 142.]

Psalm 142:

With all my voice I cry to the Lord, with all my voice I entreat the Lord. I pour out my trouble before him; I tell him all my distress while my spirit faints within me. But you, O Lord, know my path.

On the way where I shall walk they have hidden a snare to entrap me. Look on my right and see: there is no one who take my part. I have no means of escape, not one who cares for my soul.

I cry to you, O Lord. I have said: "You are my refuge all I have in the land of the living." Listen, then, to my cry. for I am in the depths of distress.

Rescue me from those who pursue me for they are stronger than I. Bring my soul out of this prison and then I shall praise your name. Around me the just will assemble because of your goodness to me.





Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: As it was in the beginning, is now, and will are for ever. Amen.

[Repeat the Antiphon.]

<u>Antiphon</u>: Alleluia, Alleluia, Francis, poor and humble, enters heaven rich and is welcomed with celestial hymns. Alleluia.

[Extinguish the candles to signify the death of Saint Francis.]

Then, having in mind St. Francis' devotion to the wounds of our Lord, and looking at the figure of the Crucified, with arms outstretched, say five times the prayer of our Lord: *Our Father*...

[After the 5 Our Fathers, pray the following prayer.]

O God, you granted our blessed Father Francis the reward of everlasting joy: grant that we, who celebrate the memory of his death, may at last come to the same eternal joy; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

[End *The Transitus Service* with the following blessing.] May the Lord + bless us, protect us from all evil and bring us to everlasting life. Amen.
