FROM OUR REGIONAL SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT

Dear Franciscan sisters and brothers,

May our Risen Lord give you His peace!

A blessed and happy and holy Easter to one and all! The joy we experience as people of faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead cannot possibly be limited to one 24-hour period, this year April 9th Easter Sunday. Rather, we celebrate for 50 glorious days, beginning on Easter Sunday (actually, with the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening) all the way through and including the great Solemnity of Pentecost when we commemorate the gift of God's Holy Spirit being poured out upon our Most Blessed Mother Mary and the Apostles and the infant Church.

This Easter season finds us in the midst of our Church's observance of the National Eucharistic Revival which began on June 19, 2022, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (aka *Corpus Christi*). It has as its mission to "renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist," as stated on the initiative's website. Sponsored by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), the revival aims to inspire people to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist. Here are a few things to know about the National Eucharistic Revival.

What is the Eucharistic Revival?



The Eucharistic Revival is a three-year initiative that aims to inspire, educate, and unite. In a world where not many people know Jesus intimately, the revival is meant to show everyone what wonders the True Presence of Jesus can do to heal the soul. Through a carefully planned timeline of events, after three years, the U.S. Catholic Bishops hope to change the lives of many Catholics and non-Catholics alike.

As the campaign organizers say on the revival's website, those who have been "healed, converted, formed, and unified" by the

Eucharist have a mission to teach others "for the life of the world." This is what the National Eucharistic Revival envisions for the future of this movement.

Why are the U.S. bishops doing this?

The current world is hurting and straying far from God. According to **Pew Research Center**, only 31% of Catholics even believe in the True Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. It is up to that 31% (and, hopefully, we Franciscans are surely among that



31%!) to spread the truth to all. As the revival website says, "We all need healing, yet many of us are separated from the very source of our strength. Jesus Christ invites us to return to the source and summit of our faith — his Real Presence in the Holy Eucharist." It is a time to confront the hardships that face people in everyday life. The National Eucharistic Revival is a powerful, uplifting way to rise to this challenge.

From June of 2022 through June of 2023, each diocese was to offer events to promote and inspire understanding of the Eucharist. The training of "eucharistic missionaries" will come through online and in-person resources that teach about Christ and the Real Presence.

Spanning until July 2024 and beyond, the movement will also include a Year of Parish Revival, a National Eucharistic Congress in 2024, and the National Year of Mission. Each year will be dedicated to serving a specific purpose in the National Eucharistic Revival's mission.

When is the National Eucharistic Congress?

This major national event will be held in Indianapolis, Indiana, from July 17-21, 2024. Over 100,000 Catholics are expected to "worship our Risen Lord in his humble disguise" and allow the Holy Spirit to "enkindle a missionary fire in the heart of our nation," according to the revival website. This "National Pilgrimage" will have both in-person and remote options, so everyone can take part in this solemn celebration.



How can we get involved?



There are many ways for individuals all over the United States to get involved in the National Eucharistic Revival. Catholics are given the option to become prayer partners, share testimonies, and call on the Holy Spirit to encourage and strengthen this movement. The revival calls upon "laypeople, families, religious orders, and priests to volunteer their time, talents, and prayers in pursuit of the grassroots

renewal our world so desperately needs," its website says. Available learning resources include Corpus Christi novenas in both English and Spanish, a document prepared by the USCCB entitled Church (which should be an excellent and timely portion of each local fraternity's ongoing formation process over the next few years), a question and answer page about the Eucharist, and a free course by Bishop Andrew H. Cozzens of the Archdiocese of Crookston on learning to embrace the gift of the Eucharist. More resources will become available throughout the movement's timeline.

Where can one go for more information?

The best spot for more information is the National Eucharistic Revival <u>website</u> itself. Not only does it have an abundance of learning resources and prayer assistance, but also a list of answered <u>frequently asked questions</u>. The USCCB <u>website</u> also has a wealth of resources.

We Franciscans do well to recall that we are the inheritors of an incredibly rich tradition of Eucharistic devotion. Our Seraphic Father himself exhorted us: "Let everyone be struck with fear, let the whole world tremble, and let the heavens exult when Christ, the Son of the



living God, is present on the altar in the hands of a priest! O wonderful loftiness and



stupendous dignity! O sublime humility! O humble sublimity! The Lord of the universe, God and the Son of God, so humbles Himself that for our salvation He hides Himself under an ordinary piece of bread! Brothers, look at the humility of God, and *pour out your hearts before Him!* Humble yourselves that you may be exalted by Him! Hold back nothing of yourselves for yourselves, that He Who gives Himself totally to you may receive you totally!" (from his *Letter to the Entire Order*, written in 1225 or 1226).

How extraordinarily blessed are we Franciscans of the Prairie Region that our annual Regional Retreat this year is entitled "Jesus Shows Himself to Us: Seeing Jesus Present and Living a Eucharistic Centered Life." Our Retreat Director will be Father Luke Spannagel of the Peoria Diocese and the Retreat will be held at Sacre Coeur Retreat Center, Magnolia, Illinois, October 13-15, 2023. This will be our first in-person Retreat since 2019. I hope that many of us will make the commitment to experience this graced time together!

Profession in the Order is the culmination of three years of study. She promised to follow the Rule of Life in The Secular Franciscan Order and to live the gospel in the spirit of Saint Francis of Assisi. Her goal as a Secular Franciscan is to live the Christian call to holiness in her individual life—in her home and in the world. A fraternity is a group of Secular Franciscans in an area who meet regularly for prayer and study and encourage one another to live their commitment. The name of the Fraternity is Saint Francis of Assisi, located in Teutopolis, IL.

Saint Francis of Assisi wrote the first Rule of the Life over 800 years ago for the married women who wanted to follow Saint Clare of Assisi into the cloistered convent and the married men of his time who wanted to follow him. Saint Francis instructed these couples that God did not want them to separate and leave one another and their families.

Today, the Secular Franciscan Order is comprised of lay women, married and single; lay men, married and single; and priests and deacons. Members live by a revised Rule of Life approved and promulgated by Pope Saint Paul VI on June 24, 1978.

POPE ST. JOHN XXIII FRATERNITY - ROCK ISLAND

Our fraternity will focus on the 8th Centenary of the Approval of the Later Rule of St. Francis and the Christmas at Greccio in ongoing formation here in 2023. We are also preparing for our combined Fraternal and Pastoral Visitation on Sunday, July 2nd, the day after the regional fraternity picnic.

On a personal note, I spent time in Peru over the past months, including two visits to the Basilica and Convent of San Francisco in Lima. An earthquake in 1655 brought down the previous convent with the present basilica and convent being built in the late 1600-early 1700s. I've never been to Rome, so the history in this church structure and others in Central Lima were all pretty amazing to me. There is the church proper and then there is the areas designated as museum, even catacombs that we saw.

In one of the hallways in the museum, there was a display that referenced Father Joseph Francis of Guadalupe Mojica OFM, who was born in Saint Gabriel of Jalisco, Mexico, on September 14, 1896. He was a famous singer of opera and Hollywood film artist who left the artistic life and entered the Franciscan order at the age of 46. He died in Lima on September 20, 1974.

Tibor was the first speaker with a very informative presentation about "The OFS and The Popes." This was appropriate in preparation for Pope Francis's upcoming visit to Hungary on April 28-30, 2023. Pope Francis visited Hungary in 2021 for the International Eucharistic Congress. This was of course an international event held in Hungary. The Catholic faithful are pleased that the Holy Father will return specifically to visit the Hungarian people. Tibor met Pope Saint John Paul II once, and Pope Francis three

times in person. Pope Francis also met the participants of the General Chapter of the OFS in November of 2021. Tibor was able to share his personal impressions about meeting with the Popes as well as review the history of the order in light of the leadership of various Popes.

The second speaker was Fr. Zatyko, who spoke about our mandate to be missionaries and proclaim the Gospel everywhere we are. He talked about St. Francis' visit to the Sultan. St. Francis was accepting of differences but uncompromising when it came to proclaiming the truths of the faith. Only a fearless person can win over the world.
