REGIONAL MINISTER'S LETTER

Greetings in Christ to you all!

As I write this note to you all on the Feast of St. Clare, my thoughts have been looking at her dedication to our Lord, and especially how she served the Order!

I wish to reach out to all of you and 'chat' – or as well as we can while you read through our beautiful Portiuncula Newsletter of our Region. Let's 'chat' about how we view and serve our Lord in our Vocation to the Franciscan Order. Here are some simple questions we'll 'chat' about. This is all taken from the *Ritual of the Secular Franciscan Order*. – (Well worth some formation time).

When you Professed, do you remember the 3 questions the Celebrant asked you that day at Mass?? Do you remember why you were at Mass for this? Let us look at that together. We, each of us, at our Profession, were asked three questions. (*For those in Formation – I pray you have a chance to read through this beautiful Profession rite and I know there are times when variants are done in the wording – yet how beautiful*).

“Do you wish to embrace the gospel way of life by following the example and words of St. Francis of Assisi, which are at the heart of the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order?”

“You have been called to give witness to the Kingdom of God and to build a more fraternal world based on the gospel, together with all people of goodwill. Do you wish to be faithful to this vocation and to practice the spirit of service proper to Secular Franciscans?”

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“You have been made members of the People of God by your Baptism, and strengthened in Confirmation by the new gift of the Spirit, in order to proclaim Christ by your life and your words. *Do you wish to bind yourself more closely to the Church and to work intently to rebuild the ecclesial community and fulfill its mission among all people?*”

We are Eucharistic People – We celebrate our Profession during Mass because the nature of permanent commitment as a public and ecclesial act is closely tied to the celebration of the Eucharist.

As you can also see – there is such richness that we can chat together on for a while. Perhaps we can do so in person at the Retreat this Fall – Let us all take pause to review our commitment to the Order and be reminded that we are truly a part of the Order and we have so much to talk about. At our upcoming Retreat we will again recommit ourselves to our Profession.

Again, thank you for all your prayers for my recouping from Brother COVID and also for attending the National Chapter. By the time you all receive this Newsletter, I will have attended the 2023 National Chapter with a Visitation from representatives from the International Fraternity (Aug. 22—27th). I’ll be sharing more on this later to your Local Ministers.

FROM OUR REGIONAL SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT

Dear Franciscan sisters and brothers,
May the Lord give you peace!

I pray that this edition of ***The Portiuncula*** finds everyone enjoying good health and the Lord’s blessings! Thus far this year, Regional Minister Kathy Adams, O.F.S. and I have been pursuing a very deliberate schedule of visiting the local Fraternities which compose our Regional family, especially since the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted our normal three-year rotation of Visitations (just as it extended the time between elections that Councils at all levels of the Order were required to serve). Article 26 of the *Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order* concludes with these words: “To promote fidelity to the [Franciscan] charism as well as observance of the *Rule* and to receive greater support in the life of the fraternity, the Minister... with the

consent of the Council, should take care to ask for a regular pastoral visit by the competent religious superiors as well as for a fraternal visit from those of the higher fraternities, according to the norm of the *Constitutions*.”

Title VI of the *General Constitutions of the Secular Franciscan Order* (articles 92-95) address the issue of the Fraternal Visit and the Pastoral Visit. Our *Franciscans of the Prairie Regional Guidelines* also contain sections on the Fraternal Visitation (lines 533-551) and the Pastoral Visitation (lines 553-569). Local Councils are asked to review and study these sections of these governing documents in order to help prepare for fruitful Visitations; some fraternities even present and discuss them as part of their Ongoing Formation prior to being visited, and everyone is asked to pray specifically that the Holy Spirit will inspire each Visit and its outcome.

The Church and the Order place great emphasis on the value of the local fraternity as “...the basic unit of the whole Order and a visible sign of the Church, the community of love. This should be the privileged place for developing a sense of Church and the Franciscan vocation and for enlivening the apostolic life of its members” (*OFS Rule*, Art. 22). On April 16, 2021, the Conference of National Spiritual Assistants (CNSA) and the OFS-USA National Executive Council (NEC) approved and published *ad experimentum* a document entitled **Guide to Canonical Establishment of a Secular Franciscan Fraternity**. In addition to specifying the particular steps and details of how a Secular Franciscan fraternity is to be established, this **Guide** contains some very rich foundational reflections on the meaning of fraternity in the Franciscan tradition.

What follows are some selected excerpts.

What is a Secular Franciscan Fraternity?

Let’s begin by clarifying what a Secular Franciscan fraternity is **not**.

- It is not a prayer group, although members do pray when they gather.
- It is not a support group, although members do support each other.
- It is not a study group, although formation in the Franciscan way of life is an ongoing part of every gathering.
- It is not a Bible study group, although the Gospels form the basis of OFS life and are frequently discussed.
- It is not a social ministry group, although members participate in a variety of social ministries.
- It is not a parish organization, although most fraternities do meet in parish facilities.

So, what **is** a fraternity, then? **The local fraternity is the basic unit of the Secular Franciscan Order** (the OFS). It has **a special purpose** which is defined by the OFS legislation, and **a unique identity** (called a “juridical personality”) **in the Church**.

Let’s unpack these statements.

A Secular Franciscan fraternity is **part of an established Order in the Church**, which has certain implications.

- The fraternity itself must be **officially ‘established’ by one of the Franciscan friar provinces** that have ecclesiastical responsibility for the OFS. It is thus by definition not a parish or diocesan organization.
- Individual members are **bound more intimately to the Church**, which is why full membership is open only to Catholics in full communion with the Church.

That describes the fraternity’s identity as it relates to the Church. What about its **purpose**?

- First and foremost, **the purpose of the Order** (and thus the purpose of the fraternity, all OFS members, and all those who belong to the Franciscan Family) is to **make present the Franciscan charism in the life and mission of the Church** (OFS Rule, Art. 1).
- In and of itself, the fraternity is **a service to the Church**. “Fidelity to their own charism, Franciscan and secular, and the witness of building fraternity, sincerely and openly, are their principal services to the Church, which is the community of love (OFS General Constitutions [GC], Art. 100.3).”
- “The Fraternity of the OFS finds its origin in the inspiration of Francis of Assisi to whom the Most High revealed the essential gospel quality of life in fraternal communion.” (GC 28.1) As an integral part of OFS life, it is marked by fraternal communion and is **a means of holiness**.

General attitudes that are helpful to keep in mind

- **Make building community your priority.** A fraternity doesn’t just happen automatically, without significant effort on the part of its members. It needs to be worked for to become a reality. Resolve that your commitment to your Secular Franciscan vocation and to the fraternity will take precedence over your involvement in other organizations, including those of the parish.
- **Cultivate a sense of co-responsibility within the fraternity.** Unlike other organizations where responsibility for the well-being of the group is held by a small number, in a fraternity all members share responsibility for the life of the fraternity. “The sense of co-responsibility of the members requires personal presence, witness, prayer and active collaboration, in accordance with each one’s means and possible obligations for the animation of the Fraternity” (GC 30.2).

- **Acknowledge that community takes time to develop.** Look for opportunities to work together, visit together, pray together, study together and have fun together. Don't limit yourselves to the monthly fraternity gathering but find ways to interact with fellow Franciscans throughout the month.
- **Appreciate differences.** Fraternal unity does not imply uniformity. Our differences add to the richness of life and bring a wide variety of gifts and talents to the fraternity. They are a positive advantage and should not be allowed to become the cause of dissension. Which of us can be complete without his brothers and sisters?
- **Beware of being judgmental.** Being judgmental is one of the easiest ways to poison the spirit of the fraternity. "Blessed is the person that puts up with the frailty of his neighbor to the extent he would like his neighbor to put up with him if he were in a similar plight." (*Admonition XVIII**)
- **Practice forgiveness.** "...I wish to know in this way if you love the Lord and me, His servant and yours: that there is not any brother in the world who has sinned — however much he could have sinned —who, after he has looked into your eyes, would ever depart without your mercy, if he is looking for mercy. And if he were not looking for mercy, you would ask him if he wants mercy. And if he would sin a thousand times before your eyes, love him more than me so that you may draw him to the Lord..." (*Letter to a Minister**). Even in our fraternities, we will have many opportunities to apply this advice.

And finally, and most important

- **Follow St. Francis' advice** to his brothers. "Pursue what you should desire above all else, namely, to have the Spirit of God and God's grace working in you..." (cf. *Earlier Rule XVII**). When you come right down to it, all the attitudes and techniques in the world are insufficient to form a genuine ecclesial community. The Holy Spirit is the one who breathes life into your fraternity, who molds you and brings you together as one.



REFLECTIONS FROM THE REGIONAL VICE MINISTER ON THE MANY FORMS OF SERVANT LEADERSHIP

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Peace and all good! As I prepared to write this a few days ago, it started out as an article introducing Jacques Elloye, OFS, our Regional Database Councilor. The original purpose was describing Jacques' journey from the Ivory Coast, Africa, his homeland, to Warsaw, Poland, where he lived for 11 years. He attended the University of Warsaw and there met his wife. They married in 1997. They have three children, two now grown and one teenager still at home. In 2000, they moved to the US, and Jacques was employed by Caterpillar. When Jacques relocated to Illinois, he was able to transfer to the Sacred Heart Fraternity. But then in 2007, Jacques was diagnosed with kidney failure. It was advanced to stage 3 at the time. By 2021, Jacques began daily dialysis for 10-11 hours a day. Currently his employer allows him to work from home.

Over the course of our first year being on the Regional Executive Council, I was able to learn about these serious medical concerns, and how difficult it was to get a transplant. In sharing this with you (with Jacques' permission), I was going to ask for us to storm heaven with prayers for a donor. However, on the feast of St. Clare, Jacques was called to go to the University of Chicago Hospital for his transplant. As of today, the surgery has been successful, and Jacques is in for a long recovery but one in which he can live without the burden of dialysis. Let's offer our collective prayers in Thanksgiving.

So now I am encouraging all of us to really get to know our brothers and sisters. Part of the Gathering needs to be designated for the purposes of "social time", as well as, Ongoing Formation, Business, and praying together. We do share in charitable activities as individuals and as a group, but we need to make sure we are not missing helping our brother or sister who is right beside us, or possibly the brother or sister at home or who is unable to attend any longer for various reasons. Can we bring a part of the Gathering to them?

In Article 12 of our Rule, it is stated: "Witnessing the good yet to come and obliged to acquire purity of heart because of the vocation they have embraced, they should set themselves free to love God and their brothers and sisters."

We offer prayers of Thanksgiving for this gift of love from an anonymous donor. We thank God for their generosity and pray for their recovery as well.

"Like a chain reaction" where energy is imparted but does not go to waste, this will allow Jacques to have an active life and continue his journey with his family and fraternity.

This is an example of what happens when we choose to do good and make a sacrifice for the good of others. May God bless you!

SOMETHING TO PONDER ...

It happens that an invaluable thing is lost at a cheap price; and that easily provokes the Giver not to give another time. From Thomas of Celano, First Life of St. Francis, pg. 99.

The invaluable thing of which St. Francis here speaks is any special grace or gift of God. St. Francis compares God's action with that of any normal human being. If a friend were to give you something very valuable such as a watch, jewelry, or expensive machine, and then you very carelessly lost it or else exchanged it at a cheap price, you may be sure that your friend would not readily give you more gifts like that. Such a way of action on your part easily provokes the Giver not to give another time.

So also, says St Francis, with the gift of God. If we do not appreciate and treasure up the graces God gives us, but rather foolishly squander or carelessly lose them, then God will tend to withhold his graces. Let us apply this to the graces of our vocation. God has given us a call to a religious life with all the external aids and abundant internal graces that grow with it. If we do not treasure up and put to good use our prayer time, our opportunities for silence and recollection, for spiritual reading, for humility, obedience, and mortification, why shall God not withdraw his many graces and perhaps even allow us to lose our vocations? It would indeed be a just punishment we lost at a cheap price an invaluable thing.
